Dear Readers,


This session, the Editorial team is elated to bring forth the second edition of The Charis High Scoop.

Webinar on World No Tobacco Day


The World Health Organization has designated 31st May as 'World No Tobacco Day'. The theme for this year is 'Commit to Quit'.

Charis High Academy organized a webinar on 'World No Tobacco Day' for parents, teachers and students. The resource persons were Dr. (Ms.) Shirley T. Leivon, HOD, CIHSR, Dept. of Radiation Oncology and Ms. Linoka, Consultant for National Tobacco Control Programme (NTCP), Dimapur.



The webinar started with our Principal welcoming our administrator, resource persons, parents, teachers and students to the session. Next, Ms. Linoka and Dr. Shirley took turns to explain how tobacco adversely affects the immune system and impairs lung function, making the users more vulnerable to developing respiratory infections like colds, influenza, tuberculosis, pneumonia, chronic obstructive pulmonary diseases (COPD), etc. Miss Linoka, further emphasized that tobacco not only harms our physical and mental health but it affects our financial and social life as well. She also presented slides on Global Adult Tobacco Survey (GATS) Nagaland, 2009-10 and 2016-17.

The session ended with our Science teacher, Mr. Sorin Jagoi, thanking the resource persons for sharing their valuable time and inputs to educate us on a healthy and smoke free lifestyle.




The Managing Committee, Principal, staff and students send their heartiest congratulations to our budding artists. Kudos to both of you!















































































For a Greener Tomorrow







6.	Classes 9 & 10	Record a video of yourself reciting Rabindranath Tagore's famous poem, 'Where The Mind is Without Fear'







































Pre-Primary Corner




